Slovak League of America Celebrates Centennial

The month of May marked the 100th anniversary of a special event in Slovak history—the founding of the Slovak League of America, a civic and cultural federation of Americans of Slovak ancestry. The large population of Slovaks that emigrated to the U.S. during the late 19th and early 20th centuries remained concerned about events in Europe. Slovaks had endured more than a thousand years of Hungarian political domination, and as conditions continued to worsen, Slovaks in America sought to support their brethren. Led by fraternal leaders Rev. Stephen Furdek of the First Catholic Slovak Union and Peter V. Rovnianek of the National Slovak Society, nearly 10,000 Slovaks, representing a variety of organizations and churches, gathered in Cleveland in May 1907 to form the umbrella organization.

The Slovak League supported Slovaks domestically, but also played a key role in supporting Slovaks' quest for freedom and self-determination in Europe throughout the 20th century. The League played a key role in the Cleveland and Pittsburgh Agreements that led to the emergence of the Czecho-Slovak Republic. When the events leading to World War II resulted in an independent Slovak state, the league advocated for its recognition while fully supporting the U.S. war effort at home with a hugely successful war bond drive. With the re-emergence of a post-war Czecho-Slovak state, and the unfortunate turn to Communism, the League continued its diligent advocacy for Slovaks' aspirations for freedom. Then, with the coming of the "Velvet Revolution" and the subsequent "Velvet Divorce", the League served as a key supporter of improvement in Slovak social, political and economic life.

In celebrating its' Centennial year, the League has sponsored a tour to Slovakia, which includes a historical seminar, a meeting with Slovak President Gasparovich, and the dedication of a statue of League co-founder Rev. Furdek. Also, the Slovak Republic will issue a commemorative postage stamp in honor of the founding of the League. Finally, the League will hold an anniversary dinner on Sunday, June 10, 2007 at the Crown Plaza Hotel at the Meadowlands in New Jersey. SASW extends to the Slovak League, and its current National President, Daniel F.Tanzone, its congratulations and best wishes!

From Dunn Loring Metro

-- Take a cab (3 miles) to Viera's house or call 703-280-1625 in advance and we will come to pick you up.

By Car

from West MD or VA

-- Take the Beltway to Arlington Blvd. West; take left on Prosperity Avenue, take left on Morningside Drive.

from East MD or VA

-- Take the Beltway to Little River Turnpike, take right on Prosperity Avenue, take right on Morningside Drive.

from DC and inside Beltway VA

-- Take 66 West, take exit to go to I-495 Richmond and take exit to Arlington Blvd West, take left on Prosperity Avenue, take left on Morningside Drive.

from VA East

--Take 66 East, take Nutley Street exit, make left on Arlington Blvd., make right on Prosperity Ave., take left on Morningside Drive. (or you can take Arlington Blvd instead of I-66).

Your Support is Needed on the Visa Waiver Issue!—In the last newsletter, we mentioned efforts to extend the Visa Waiver Program (VWP) to a number of central European countries, including Slovakia. This would allow Slovaks to travel to the U.S. without having to go through the process of obtaining a visa. This visa process can be lengthy and costly and often denies Slovaks citizens entry to the U.S. for business opportunities, tourism or family contact. A number of organizations are leading an effort to support legislation to revise the VWP, with the Friends of Slovakia (FOS) playing a key role in the effort on the part of Slovaks. FOS has circulated a letter explaining these efforts, which you can access at www.friendsofslovakia.org. SASW is supporting these efforts as well, and we urge you to contact your congressional representatives and ask that they co-sponsor the legislation to reform the VWP and support it when it comes up for a vote. To assist your efforts, a sample letter can be found below. The letter was provided to us by Joe Senko of FOS and the Western PA Slovak Cultural Assn. (WPSCA). He notes that it is preferable to write the letter in your own words. Also, it is best to email or fax your message to your Representatives and Senators, as regular US mail may be slowed by security considerations. This issue is very important to Slovakia, and Amb. Kacer is working on it very hard. Your support is needed to convince Congress to revise the VWP.

Slovak and Czech movies in DC---As we went to press, we did not have a firm date for the next installment of the FOS Slovak film series at the Embassy. The expected date is sometime later in June or July. We will send out an announcement on deslovaks when information is available. In the meantime, the Czech Film Series continues in DC. On June 13, 2007, 8 pm, the Avalon Theatre will screen *Return of the Idiot* (Navrat idiota), directed by Sasa Gedeon, and winner of 6 Czech Lion Awards. The film is in Czech with English subtitles. This summer, the Avalon Theatre will bring more Czech Lion Award winning films to the DC-area including, Bitter Coffee (Silny kafe), and Autumn Spring (Babi leto). The Avalon Theatre is located at 5612 Connecticut Avenue, NW, Washington, DC 20015. Tickets may be purchased at the box office 30 minutes before the start of the show. Amb. Kacer term extended—We have just learned that Slovak Ambassador Kacer will remain in Washington for another year. His term was expected to end this summer.

Passing of Paul Albrecht--SASW was saddened to hear of the passing of one of our most distinguished members, Dr. Paul Albrecht. We extend our sympathies to his wife, Renata and the entire Albrecht family. The following obituary appeared in the Washington Post, Wednesday, May 2, 2007; Page B07

Paul Albrecht; FDA Expert On Infectious Diseases

Paul Albrecht, 82, a Food and Drug Administration virologist, immunologist and pathologist who developed diagnostic techniques used to research and treat infectious diseases, died of cancer April 11 at his daughter's home in Rockville. He was a Rockville resident. After an early scientific career in his native Czechoslovakia, Dr. Albrecht settled in the Washington area in 1965. He worked at the National Institutes of Health and worked closely with future Nobel laureate D. Carleton Gajdusek on studies of kuru, a slow virus disease. Dr. Albrecht joined the FDA in 1967 and retired in 1993 as director of virology at its Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research.

During his career, he did extensive antibody testing on vaccines for polio, rubella and pediatric infectious diseases. In his research, he often collaborated with the leading scientists in their respective fields, including Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin on polio, and Harry M. Meyer Jr. and Paul Parkman on rubella. Dr. Albrecht also consulted with the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and other institutions on major immunization projects and hosted visiting scientists in his FDA lab. He published more than 130 articles on pathology and virology. His work on measles vaccine investigations, on which he published widely, helped lead to new recommendations on the best age for immunization.

Dr. Albrecht was born in Presov, in what is now Slovakia. In 1949, he received a medical degree from Comenius University medical school in Bratislava. Starting in 1955, he spent a decade at the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences, working at its institute of virology. In 1960, he received a doctorate in virology from the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences and specialized in immunofluorescent antibodies for detection of various antigens in tissues. He also published a book in 1963 on how to look at antigens in tissues using fluorescent antibodies. The book used the best photographic resolutions at the time to achieve clear images of tissue slides.

His memberships included the American Society for Microbiology, the New York Academy of Sciences and the Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine. He presented his scientific findings around the world and helped create vaccine guidelines internationally. Besides English, Czech and Slovak, Dr. Albrecht was fluent in Polish, Russian, German and Hungarian. He kept a 41-foot Morgan sailboat in Galesville and sailed on the Chesapeake Bay. Survivors include his wife of 54 years, Dr. Renata Gruner Albrecht of Rockville; two children, Dr. Renata Albrecht Farkas of Rockville and Paul Albrecht of Bedford, Mass.; and six grandchildren.

The Flag Raisers---The recent Memorial Day Holiday focused our attention on those who have served and sacrificed for our country. It is a good time to remember the role that a young Slovak American, Sgt. Michael Strank, played in what has become the most enduring symbol of the spirit of our nation's armed forces---the raising of the US flag by the Marines on Iwo Jima in WWII.
