November 5, 2022 – <u>Prof. Edward Snajdr</u>, John Jay College, CUNY, continued his account of the rise and fall of environmentalism in Slovakia, based on his book Nature Protests: The End of Ecology in Slovakia. Slovak greens transformed from brave challengers of totalitarianism during the Velvet Revolution into intrepid proponents of ecology in a highly dynamic landscape of post-communist politics and society. "Argonauts of the Eastern Bloc: Environmentalism in Slovakia after the Velvet Revolution"

September 17, 2022 – <u>Mary Gido</u> presented a brief history of Rusyn/Slovak spinning, weaving, and bobbin-lace making, and their importance to families and villages. She also spoke about the processes of harvesting plants, processing fibers, and creating fabrics that supported the lives of the villagers, and the skill and imagination that made the textiles colorful and beautiful. "Threads Across Time: Rusyn/Slovak Spinning, Weaving, and Bobbin Lacemaking"

March 26, 2022 – <u>George Clyne</u> showed how to make pysanky with some simple designs. He explained and demonstrated the techniques, which allowed participants to make their own pysanky at the same time. "Easter Egg (Pysanka) Workshop with George"

March 5, 2022 – <u>Prof. Marty Manor Mullins</u>, Flathead Valley Community College, described Košice's and eastern Slovakia's communist-era unique mix of ethnic, religious, and workingclass elements, and the roles they played at key points in Czechoslovakia's history. These elements led to Košice experiencing Czechoslovakia's 20th-century upheavals differently than either Prague or Bratislava. "Košice's Influential Communist-Era Subversives"

February 1, 2022 – <u>Dr. Michaela Musilová</u>, HI-SEAS (Hawaii Space Exploration Analog and Simulation research station) shared her experiences in leading over 30 simulated space missions, as well as her personal story of how she became an astronaut in the first place. She also spoke about the current state of Slovakia's space activities, including some exciting new projects, and the country's prospects of becoming a member of the European Space Agency. May 15, 2021 – <u>Prof. Kevin Deegan-Krause</u>, Wayne State University, and <u>Prof. Tim Haughton</u>, University of Birmingham (U.K.), used a decade's worth of research to explain Slovakia's plethora of political parties and the country's rapid political changes. "The New Party Challenge in Slovakia: Understanding and Dealing with Constant Political Change"
